According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, smoking is the leading cause of preventable death and disease. Smoking has negative health effects on people at all stages of life. Smoking is particularly dangerous to unborn babies, infants and children.

EFFECTS ON THE FETUS

The fetus of a pregnant woman who smokes receives all the toxins from a cigarette through the mother's bloodstream. There is an increased risk of complications such as:

- Spontaneous abortion
 Stillbirth

- Miscarriage
- Early delivery

Certain chemicals, such as nicotine and carbon monoxide, prevent the fetus from receiving the oxygen and the nutrients needed to grow.

EFFECTS ON INFANTS

Infants of mothers who smoke during pregnancy have higher rates of infant mortality and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). Their babies are also more likely to have brain dysfunction and experience mental retardation. In addition, these babies are at higher risk for poor lung development, respiratory infection and asthma.

EFFECTS ON CHILDREN

- Onset of asthma. attacks
- Behavioral problems
- Hyperactivity
- Middle ear infections
- Eve irritations

- Bronchitis
- Headaches
- Cystic Fibrosis
- Pneumonia
- Impaired school performance

ASTHMA

Asthma is a serious lung disease. During an asthma attack, the airways narrow making it difficult to breathe. Asthma attacks range from moderate to severe.

Moderate attack symptoms include:

- Coughing
- Wheezing
- Difficulty with breathing
- Tightness in the chest

Severe attack symptoms include:

- Difficulty speaking
- Gasping and loss of breath
- Bluish lips and fingernails due to lack of oxygen
- Tight neck muscles

Secondhand smoke is one of asthma's greatest triggers. Choose not to smoke in the presence of others. The air that children breathe affects their health!
